Interim English Grade 11 Listening Scripts

By the time the regional competition took place, the transformation was remarkable. Instead of rapid-fire attacks, their debates became thoughtful exchanges. The team did not win first place, but its members learned how meaningful communication transpires just by taking turns speaking.
